



Beegu, by Alexis Deacon

Find out in this fully illustrated book that features more than 100 machines and things that go. Enjoy the amazing illustrations and information about machines in different settings.









The Jolly Postman by Janet and Allan Ahlberg




Asterix the Gaul, by Rene Goscinny





The Great Big Book of Families, by Mary Hoffman




Finn Family Moomintroll, by Tove Jansson

The Lost Happy Endings, by Carol Anne Duffy








Horrid Henry, by Francesca Simon





Ice Bear, by Nicola Davies







A Dollop of Ghee and a Pot of Wisdom, by Chitra Soundar




How to Live Forever, by Colin Thomson






The True Story of the 3 Little Pigs, by Jon Scieska


Winnie the Pooh, by A.A. Milne





Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters, by John Steptoe

How can I help my child with their reading?

Sharing a book with a child is fun - it's a time for closeness, laughing and talking together. It can also give children a flying start in life and help them become lifelong readers.

- Set aside some time. Find somewhere quiet without any distractions turn
 off the TV/radio/computer.
- Ask your child to choose a book. Sharing books they have chosen shows
 you care what they think and that their opinion matters. This means they are
 more likely to engage with the book.
- Read to your child. Although your child will be becoming more confident
 at reading, they will still benefit greatly from being read to. You can show
 them how to read with fluency and expression. Reading to your child also
 gives them the opportunity to concentrate on thinking about the meaning of
 the story.
- Encourage your child to re-read a part of the book if they found it a
 bit challenging and read it in a faltering way on their first reading. This will
 help them develop fluency.
- Encourage your child to talk about the book. Talking about the characters and their dilemmas helps children understand relationships and is an excellent way for you to get to know each other or discuss difficult issues. Give your child plenty of time to respond. Ask them how a character might be feeling or how the book makes them feel.

And lastly, above all - make it fun! It doesn't matter how you read with a child, as long as you both enjoy the time together. Don't be afraid to use funny voices - children love this!
