The school, will however be continuing with the Game On leagues and will endeavour to find other competitive avenues if the Sports Premium Grant funding continues.  The school ensures that the minibus is available for transporting Highwood's children to swimming once a week and other sporting activities. A robust schedule of safety checks is undertaken annually and all other required paperwork is kept up to date	Without further Sports Premium Grant funding, top up swimming costs will not be sustainable from school's devolved budget.
